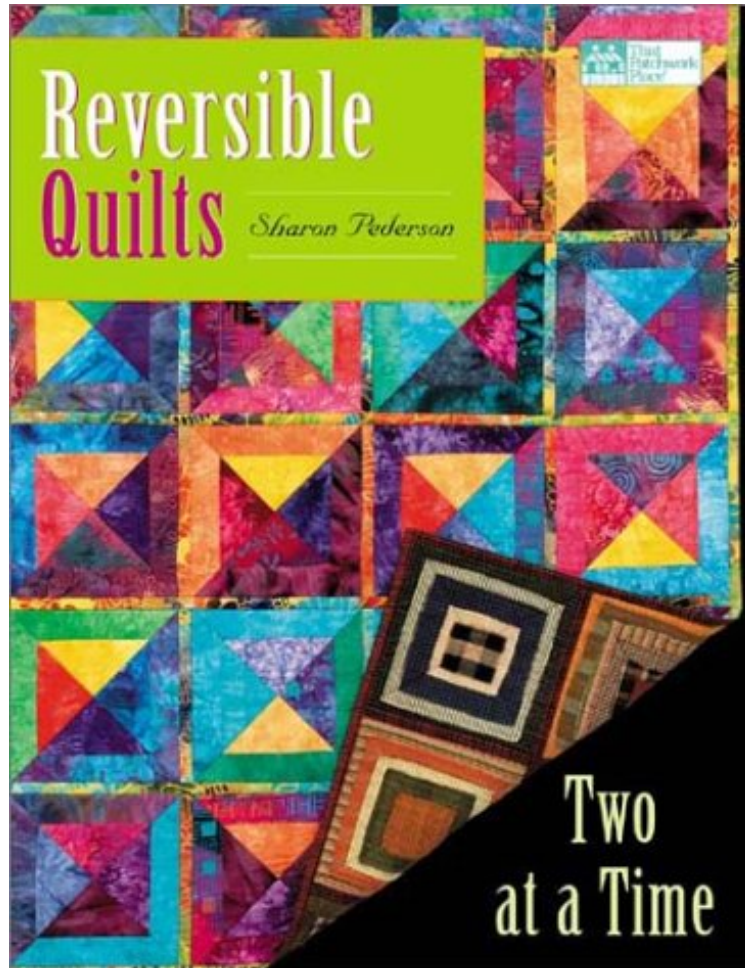

I tried the "Two Solitudes" and while I achieved the look, I am disappointed in the feel of the quilt. All that sashing made a very stiff overall quilt. It's not a quilt to curl up around oneself. Maybe a softer batting, such as a flannelette, would be a better choice.And, yes, the quilting was done when the blocks were finished, but what I saved in time quilting was lost in doing the sashing. If I do this again, I definitely will not use pieced sashing,3 of 3 people found the following review helpful. However, the finished "back" looked like a beautifully quilted whole cloth quilt! For that, I was very happy. Will use the process again on one of her

By San Antonio quilter I watched a video of the book's author doing a reversible quilt on a quilting site but wanted more detail. I got my wish with this book - although the title is a bit misleading: you don't get two quilts. You get one quilt with two different sides that, when planned carefully, can look completely different. So for instance, my first attempt was a toddler quilt with a lively crazy patch/I spy design on one side and a calming one patch design on the other. You must put a little more thought into designing the "front" and "back" before you begin sewing, but once you start to sew, it goes very quickly. And a design wall helps too, so you don't have to crawl around on your living room floor to get the lay outs right. The concept is challenging and that's a plus for me. Since I've been quilting since the '80s, I've just about seen it all. This technique lets me think about how piecing a particular pattern on one side creates a quilting pattern on the other side and will the result be pleasing? Applique blocks can be used with this technique as well - that will probably be my next attempt. The book had clear directions, good color photos and design ideas to keep me doing "two at a time" quilts for quite a while.
