They are as follows: A for Anemone / Apple Blossoms / Asters / Azaleas / Astrautia, B for Bachelor Buttons / Buttercups / Bells / Baby Blue Eyes / Babys Breath / Bullion Lazy Daisy, C for Clocks Vine / Crisscross Lazy Daisy / Carnation / Chrysanthemum / Coleus Leaves / Cockscomb / Cascade, D for Delphiniums / Daisy / Dahlia, E for Evening Primrose / Eryngium, F for Forget-Me-Nots / Fuchsias / French Knot / Forsythias / Fan / Fern, G for Grapes / Grapevine Flowers / Gardenia, H for Hydrangea / Honeysuckle / Hollyhock / Herringbone, I for Iris / Ivy / Impatiens, J for Jonquil Leave Flowers / Jasmine / Johnny Jump-Ups, K for Kelatios / Knotted Lazy Daisy, L for

Larkspur / Lavender / Lobelia / Lily-of-the-Valley / Lazy Daisy / Lilacs, M for Magnolia / Marigolds / Marguerite / Morning Glories / MJs Fluting, N for Narcissus, O for Obedient Flowers / Owls Cover / One-Twist Ribbons, P for Poinsettias / Pepper Berries / Pine Cones / Pine Boughs / Peonies / Padded Stitch / Pansies, Q for Queen-of-the-Meadow / Queens Breath / Queen Annes Lace, R for Rose Clusters (Rose of the Year, Simplicity, Touch of Class, Harmony, Lexis, Claires, Radiant, Cottage, Loves Red) / Rosette / Ribbon Stitch, S for Sunflowers / Sweet Peas / Strawberries / Self-Selvage Gathered Ribbon Stitch / Squared Off Petal / Stitches (Straight, Stem, Satin-Style) / Spider Mum / Stylized Columbine, T for Thumbagaria / Tiger Lily / Trumpet Vine / Twisted Stitch, U for Umbelliferea (Dill Flowers), V for Violets, W for Wisteria Flowers Leaves, X for Basket of Flowers, Y for Yarrow Clusters, and Z for Zinnia (Flowers, Leaves, Stems).

A complete primer of techniques and stitches, this collection includes a sampler for each letter of the alphabet. Colour pattern pages indicate stitches and ribbon work placement, making the book suitable even for beginners.

From Booklist If normal embroidery thread and needles are difficult to maneuver, ribbon work might appeal. Hiney and Anckner combine talents and techniques to create 26 completely different projects, one for each letter of the alphabet. A few of the designs do stretch to match letters with specific plants and/or flowers, and a few finished pieces might seem a bit too crowded and cluttered. Nonetheless, this is a do-it-yourself introduction to a simple craft. Barbara Jacobs
