They're so classy, but they look so SIMPLE to do, too. While some of the projects in this book are more complex, they are all basic enough in their essential construction that you don't necessarily have to have mad crafting skills to do them. Some will take more TIME, but they aren't really complicated.There's one project in here I thought was a little weird (a crying eye mobile),

but that's pretty good, in my experience. (It seems most project books have a few good ones and a bunch of "hmmm" projects.) There is variety: some cards, some envelopes or envelope embellishments, some other fun stuff to send. And nothing requires any really weird supplies -- mostly basics like paper, adhesive, and scissors, although obviously you might want to get a little fancy with the paper for some projects. You WILL probably want a craft knife for many of the projects. (Like this.)
