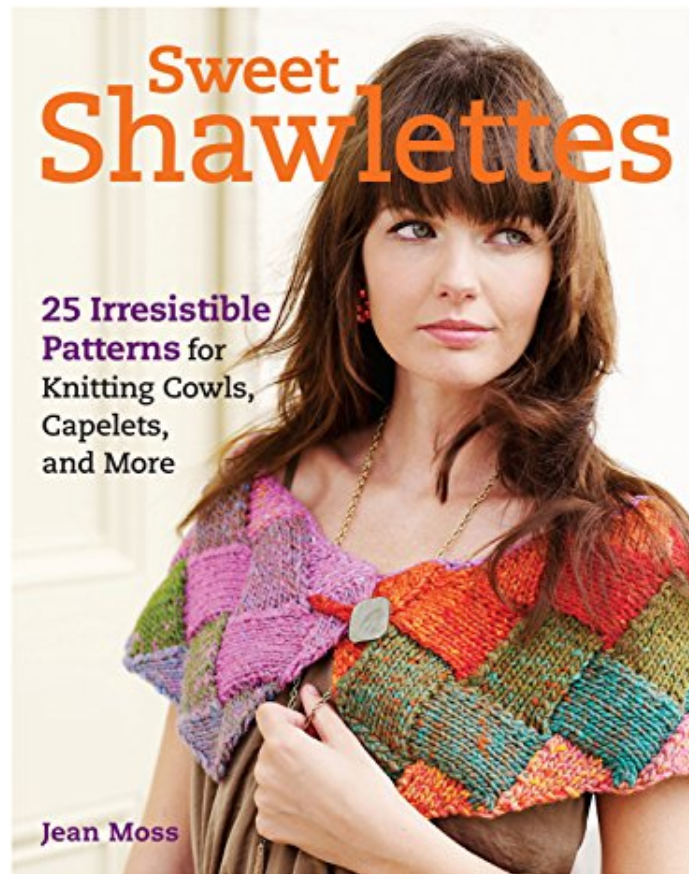

Update 2014: Have circled back to browse thru Sweet Shawlettes again and am once again impressed with the lovely, innovative designs. However, am I the only one that thinks a pattern based on a specific knit stitch--specifically Feather and Fan for the Arabesque Scarf--should include instructions for that stitch? I had to look it up on the Internet and found comments about Feather and Fan being confused with Old Shale. (See source below) One is an 18 stitch pattern, the other is a 12 stitch pattern. Personally, as a beginner/intermediate knitter who hasn't memorized the finer points of the hundreds of knit patterns available, I think FF should have been described explicitly. If I could drop my four star vote to 2.5 I would. The scarf pattern is given 4 pages in the book--why not supply complete pattern instructions?
