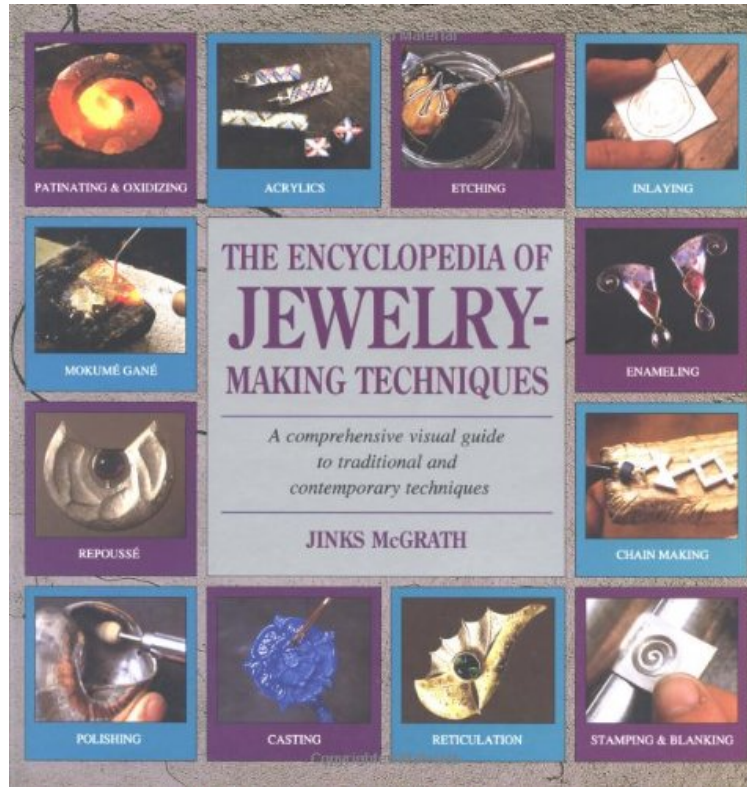

But Goldberg has four times the content and is four times as useful as McGrath.Considering some of McGrath's former work it seems like this latest book was ghost written by someone who had no idea what information was valuable to people trying to learn to make jewelry. Also, in McGrath, there is undefined UK jewelry terminology that is so arcane it doesn't get any hits on Google; and some of the content is so banal and obvious it seems like it was
